


KEBLE MAN FUNDS NEW SCHOOL OF THE 21ST CENTURY

A new School of the 21 Century at the University of Oxford founded by Dr James Martin (Keble Physics, 1952) was launched by the Chancellor of the University, Lord Patten of Barnes, at the House of Commons on 1 June. The new School will consist of a hub surrounded by associated research institutes, and is concerned with finding ways to understand and cope with the huge global challenges facing us during the next century. Initial research topics will include climate change, world poverty and global epidemics, as well as questions of aging, the future of the mind, and the ethics of the new biosciences. Dr Martin's donation of \$100 million is among the largest ever received by the University and we are excited that the administrative hub of the new School will be based on Keble's Acland site.

James Martin, born in Ashby de la Zouch, is a pioneer in computing who was an undergraduate at Keble and holds a DLitt from Oxford. His book *The Wired Society* (1977) anticipated the rise of personal computers and the internet and was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize.

A number of Keble's professorial fellows will be associated with the School, including Professor Steve Rayner (Institute of Science and Civilization), Dr Paul Jeffreys (e-Horizons Institute) and Professor Jonathan Zittrain (Oxford Internet Institute). An exceptional feature of the new School is its guarantee of new recurrent research funding in perpetuity for the leading researchers in these vital areas.



The dustiest place on earth

Keble is already significantly involved in an area of research which will be undertaken by James Martin's School of the 21st Century. Richard Washington (1992), Fellow and Tutor in Geography has spent several years researching the climate of Africa and most recently the Sahara and how aerosols/dust may affect the climate and living conditions in the wider world.

Not many people would choose to go to the Bodélé, a low-lying region on the eastern fringe of the Sahara in Northern Chad. However, Richard was part of a team recently from Oxford University, together with Earth scientists from Salford and Birkbeck College, London, which set out to investigate how dust from this region affects storm formation and cloud cover and provides minerals that fertilize the oceans and jungles of the world thousands of miles away.

'Features like the Bodélé turn out to be of planetary significance', said Richard and yet little is known about exactly how much dust is produced, by what mechanism and how much effect it has on the planet. Just what causes the Bodélé to pump out dust at such a phenomenal rate?

The Bodélé was not always like this: at one time Lake Megachad stretched across much of the country supporting numerous communities on its shores. Six thousand years ago, the lake receded taking the people with it.

THE BRICK INTERVIEW: KEBLE TRIUMVIRATE OF MPs

Alex Keenan and Richard Bliault interviewed Keble's three MPs by email since the election in May: new to the House of Commons are Ed Balls (1985), for Normanton, Labour, and Philip Dunne (1977), for Ludlow, Conservative, and returned was Andrew Turner (1973), Isle of Wight, Conservative.

What did you do before you went into politics?

After Keble, I spent 8 years with S G Warburg in London and New York. While there I co-founded Ottakar's a bookshop company. In 1990s, I worked for Phoenix, a banking business, running the Hong Kong office for three years straddling the political handover.

I studied and taught economics at Harvard and then spent four years as an economics leader writer and columnist at the Financial Times.



Liberal-leaning at 12, Young Conservative at 16 and a JCR officer at 20, in 1997, I fought the Isle of Wight. I had been an Oxford City Councillor for 17 years. Before that, I worked to get Southwark Council Education department out of special measures.

What did you take from you time at Keble into your later career, and did any of it inspire you to move into politics?

Although I read PPE at Keble, I did not get involved in student politics. I was busy with the University Air Squadron and acting. My tutors, Paul Hayes and Larry Siedentop, were influential in drawing international political themes to my attention.

My economics tutors had an important influence on me – they certainly persuaded me that economic policymakers should be able to do things better than in the late 1980s when we were studying the British economy.



The realisation that it was possible to 'move into politics'.

If you could change one thing about Britain what would it be?

The Government.



The low levels of staying on rates at school at 16 in areas like my constituency.

Wasteful use of resources, in international travel, building land, or extravagant use of food, and bad urban design.

Where do you see you see yourself in ten years time?

I would hope over 10 years to have restored the majority of Ludlow to over 10,000. This would be a major achievement in the modern political climate of voter apathy.

Ten years! A week is a long time in politics. With three children under six, I hope I see myself in ten years time able to help three teenagers with their homework!

Absolutely no idea!

What do you do to relax (and is it the same as what you did to relax at Keble)?

I try to spend time with my four children. I like to take them to do things which are not part of our routine. We go to new places, try new food (not always successful), and play new games or sports, perhaps because Britain's Olympian bronze medal winner comes from Ludlow.

I probably find cooking for the family the most relaxing thing I do at weekends – not something I ever did at Keble as I lived in the College for all 3 years (I was JCR President in my final year) and went to dinner in Hall pretty much every night.

I used to do politics to relax – and as an alternative to eading. Now I read as an alternative to politics.

Current Physics DPhil student and former MCR President (2001–2), Salvador Venegas-Andraca, recently received a prestigious British Council International Student



Award. This competition is open to international students studying in the UK. Salvador's entry was one of 2,340 from 142 nationalities.

Trip to Cambodia

Charlotte Partridge writes:

With support from the Keble Association, I volunteered to help in an orphanage for children with HIV in Cambodia. The spread of HIV and AIDS is a major problem there, mainly due to a lack of funds for treatment and a lack of education about the means of transmission and effective avoidance. I was working with the Mary Knoll Sisters who are the only provider of medicine for victims and over the last 4 years have set up 8 orphanages.

I was involved in the care of 20 children, 4 months to 4 years old, and helped in the daily tasks of feeding and washing them. It was very rewarding to see

these children who had been deprived of attention for most of their lives responding to our singing and playing with them.

On occasion, I went with field workers to visit affected children who were living at home. To witness the true poverty first hand was eye-opening and very distressing. The lack of basic hygiene means that these children are more likely to succumb to disease more readily in spite of the best efforts of the field workers to educate their guardians.

I am so grateful to the Keble Association for enabling me to have this experience and



provide a little comfort in the children's joyless lives

Focus on Keble Societies — The Hursley Society

The Hursley Society is named after the village near Winchester where John Keble was Vicar for 30 years. The Keble Theological Society adopted the name of The Hursley Society following a visit there in 1996.

The Society is open to anyone interested in theology from within, or from outside Keble. It meets several times a term to discuss and explore in an open and critical way some of the issues associated with religious belief. Discussions have taken place on the role of religion in politics, the problems of suffering and reflections on the work of John Keble.



Award for Sloane Robinson Building




The Sloane Robinson Building received a Commendation at 2005 Civic Trust Awards. The Awards recognize projects that demonstrate the highest quality of design, whilst also benefiting the local environment. The building, designed by Rick Mather Architects, uses innovative technology, including a ground water heating/cooling exchange system, massively reducing energy consumption and running costs. It is estimated that the cost of heating and air conditioning the building is a third of what it would be if a conventional air based system was used.
