Students Meet Entrepreneurs

In early March Keble students met alumni who are successful entrepreneurs. For those of us who needed reassuring that it doesn't matter if you don't yet know exactly what you want to do in life, or who are budding entrepreneurs already, it was both useful and thought-provoking.

The evening began with presentations from four alumni: Daniel Joseph (1998), founder and Strategy Director of The App Business, Simon Walker (1988), media executive and entrepreneur with twenty years' experience in the digital and creative industries, John Purcell (1998), founder of executive search firm Purcell & Co, and Harri Hunt (1999), founder and Finance Director of AAMp Creative. Their short talks largely took the form of 'lessons' to those thinking of setting up their own business, and while they did not concur on all their top tips, they all provided brilliant advice that could readily be transferred to any professional field. These four were then joined by four other alumni and Kathy Harvey, Director of Oxford Executive MBA at the Saïd Business School, and took questions from students, chaired by Andrew Clayton (1995), founder and Chairman of LNP China. It was very useful to hear their different perspectives. Though at different stages in their careers, there was definitely consensus on their experiences of starting up a business.

The alumni joined students for dinner in Hall afterwards, where discussions on careers, our ideas, and their memories of Keble continued. It was a very enjoyable evening, and I hope that there will be more events that allow such valuable intermingling of current students with alumni.

Art Matters Discussed

During the Keble Arts Festival Old Members Katy Brand (1997) comedian and writer, and Barney Norris (2006) playwright and founder of the Up in Arms Theatre Company, joined a discussion about the business behind the Arts Sector. The panel was chaired by former BBC Arts Correspondent Rosie Millard. Other panelists were Paul Hobson, Director of Modern Art Oxford, Helen Goodman, Shadow Secretary for Culture, and Alastair Roberts, Director of Enterprises at the Royal Opera House.

The debate covered various aspects: from the implications of reliance on private versus public funding; that galleries and theatres have to strike a balance between mainstream high revenue projects and unusual, more challenging works; to access and social responsibility, raised by Helen Goodman, referring to the funding disparities between London and the rest of the UK.

The panel agreed that successful mainstream art can and does support independent and more specialist art forms; that for the arts to thrive greater diversity of participants and audiences was required; in answer to a student question, that many in the arts are unnecessarily apologetic about being paid appropriately for their hard work, but at the same time public money has to be used responsibly; and most importantly, students should not be put off having careers in the arts which can be both challenging and very rewarding.

Students were able to meet the panelists. Overall it was a very encouraging event for students interested in pursuing a career in

Student Life Now and Then

Organ Scholars Richard Dawson (2011) and Neil Cockburn (1990) discussed their respective experience of the Scholarship two decades apart. Neil is Head of Organ Studies at Mount Royal University Conservatory in Calgary, and Artistic Director of the Calgary Organ Festival.

Neil: We all owe a great deal to our teachers and mentors, and a good pipe organ can often be one of our most significant. What have you learned from the Tickell organ, and how has it inspired you, and guided your repertoire choices?

Richard: One of the most wonderful aspects of the new Tickell instrument is its versatility. Although conceived with the spirit of the late nineteenth-century in mind, the various colours on the organ allow extremely convincing performances of music from the 17th right up to the 21st century. It is so refreshing to have access to an instrument on which anything seems possible.

In contrast, the organ during your time went on to be replaced by the Copeman Hart digital organ. What difficulties did the instrument present, and were there positives to be gained from the experience?

Neil: Yes, when I arrived at Keble we were still using the old pipe organ, and it was in pretty poor shape. There were notes missing and stops not working, and you really couldn't play much repertoire to any serious level. It functioned up to a point as a liturgical instrument, but we were hard-pressed to render complex music effectively. Having said that, it didn't stop us from performing Duruflé's Requiem annually on All Souls' Day. So, I learned when there's job to be done, you just have to make the best of a bad situation, and the show must go on!

In terms of learning experiences, how has the Organ Scholarship met your expectation, and differed from it - either positively or negatively?

Richard: In almost all ways it has vastly exceeded my expectations. I certainly expected the standards of music making to be very high indeed, and that has definitely been the case, but I would never have dreamed of playing for a live Radio 3 broadcast or accompanying the choir for a professional recording (the Duruflé Requiem, as it happened – some things don't change!). I also have become


far more interested in choral conducting, and that has really shaped the direction of my future. Perhaps the only negative thing from an outsider's point of view is that the Organ Scholar is the only music student in his/her year at Keble. However, because we have three organ scholars at any one time, we all get along very well, and there is certainly a feeling of organ scholar camaraderie.

We are very lucky indeed to have Director of Music, Simon Whalley, to take charge of running the choir and overseeing all Chapel music making. In your time, the Organ Scholars took on this role – did you find this to be an enjoyable duty?

Neil: It sounds like you've had some wonderful experiences. When I was a student, looking after all the Chapel music gave the team of Organ Scholars a very good grounding in the administrative side of a musician's job, which has been extremely useful. In particular, attending planning meetings with the Chaplain or members of the SCR, and sometimes with external guests, gave us invaluable insights into how institutions are run. Today, having a Director of Music provides vital continuity for Chapel music, and for music in general at the College. Organ Scholars are only in office for three years, and in the senior position for just one or two years at most. Building significant relationships with the College administration - and with external institutions - takes longer than that. Not forgetting, of course, the marvellous opportunity you have of being mentored by someone of Simon's calibre and experience.

So, how do you see life after Keble?

Richard: After my degree I'll be heading off to Brighton College as the Post Graduate Assistant Teacher in Music which I'm hugely excited about. It is a role that requires both organ playing and conducting, and will give me my first real experiences as a teacher; a nervy yet thrilling prospect. Teaching has always appealed to me; I've had the most amazing time here, and were it not for the wonderful people who have taught me, I'm not sure that would have been the case. Following that, who knows? I'd love to do a



Masters degree in choral conducting, and at some point take my Fellowship of the Royal College of Organists examination.

As someone now at the top of your profession, how do you reflect on your time here? Do you have any particularly fond memories?

Neil: Congratulations - it sounds like the perfect next step for you. I think of my time at Keble very much as a beginning - opening doors to other opportunities, and setting in motion a passion for lifelong learning. I have many fond memories: I used to particularly enjoy our Friday night Compline services by candlelight. There was something so special about singing Gregorian Chant in the magnificent acoustic of the Chapel in almost darkness. Singing on the Chapel roof on Ascension Day was also something of a thrill!

Keble Geography has been most fortunate to receive a generous donation from Walter Berg in memory of C G (Gordon) Smith MBE (1921-1999), Keble Geography tutor from 1957-1983. Walter

Berg is an historian with particular interest in historical geography and was a regular visitor to Keble and the School of Geography when C G Smith was here. The endowed fund will be used to award two prizes annually and the first recipients were announced last term. The Gordon Smith Prize for Geography for best performance by a 2nd year Geographer, was shared between Cara Duckworth and Amy Creese. The Gordon Smith Dissertation Award for the best dissertation submitted at the start of year three, was shared between Amy Creese and Fiona Elliott. Amy researched the fidelity




Porta Lodge

Howard Stephens' Organ Music Comes 'Home'



In February Kathryn Taylor, daughter of former Organ Scholar Howard Stephens (1946), and her husband, delivered several boxes of Howard's organ music to the College. She was very pleased that the music was 'coming home' and gratified to think it would be played again in the Chapel by Organ Scholars. Kathryn and her sister Carol accompanied their father to the inaugural recital of the Tickell pipe organ in September 2011. Howard, who died in 2013, spent his career in music, and while Director of Music at Birkenhead School in the 1950s, taught former Music Fellow, John Caldwell (1957).




MBE for Marios Papadopoulos

Marios Papadopoulos, Fellow by Special Election of the College, was awarded an MBE in the New Year Honours for services to Music in Oxford. He founded the orchestra Oxford Philomusica in 1999 which became the University's first Orchestra in Residence in 2002. Under his guidance as Artistic Director, the orchestra gives 60 concerts a year as well as workshops and master classes. Besides his achievement as a conductor, he is also an acclaimed concert pianist, and has been a generous supporter of music at Keble over many years.

Power Sharing in Deeply Divided Places



The English Project


Robert Lipscombe (1976) has published his third novel in the format of a newspaper. The same size as a current edition of *The Times*.
