Friends of the Chapel

We are thrilled to announce that this summer the College will celebrate the foundation of Friends of Keble College Chapel to support the life and witness of the Chapel. Part of the Talbot Fund, Friends will be an opportunity for Old Members, former choir members and congregants, concert-goers and wellwishers, to promote and support the Chapel and its community as well as to gather each year in College for commensality and Evensong. The Chapel community at Keble is one of the most vibrant in Oxford, sending out members each year for both lay and ordained leadership in the wider Church. Worship and formation are at the heart of Keble Chapel. During term time, 13 weekly services are offered with around 50 Fellows, students, and staff members serving as readers, choir members, servers, ordinands, intercessors. and officiants at the daily offices. Moreover, the Chapel Choir – who have been featured on Radio 3 and released a CD last Christmas - sing at least three of these weekly services, including a Sung Eucharist, Evensong, and Compline by Candlelight (even more stunning thanks to the new lighting made possible by the generous support of donors). The Tickell organ allows an ever-expanding music

programme, including up to 15 organ and choral scholars and at least six organ recitals each term. This academic year our organ scholars led a 4-day Early Music Festival with world-class performances, master classes, and services, including a closing Evensong with the 40-part Spem in Alium. The Chapel community includes students of all faiths and none, and since Pentecost 2011 has baptised and/or confirmed 13 students. Joining with the Christian Union for Morning Prayer each week, the Chapel also hosts the Roman Catholic Chaplaincy, as well as a weekly Rosary Prayer group, started by a Keble student. Outside the daily offerings of worship, as well as the many weddings and other occasional offices outside of term, the community provides opportunities for study, a week-long retreat to Devon, day trips to Keble parishes, and is actively engaged with many of the 67 parishes of which Keble College is patron. This year, the Chapel welcomed 35 Anglo-Catholic ordinands from

across the Church of England to a 3-day Conference on 'Priestly Character' and thus continues to be true to its foundation, forming and raising leaders within the Church and beyond. As a vibrant and growing community within the College, the Chapel is excited to celebrate the launch of *Friends of Keble College Chapel* with a concert and Evensong on July 5 preceding the Summer Dinner. *Friends* will not only enable us to enhance

funding for the Chapel and its life but will also ensure that the Chapel and Choir remain treasures of our community and beyond for centuries to come.

Keble's Seat

On Mutters Moor in Devon there is a bench known as Keble's Seat where John Keble is said to have been inspired to write some of his best loved works looking out over the Lower Otter Valley and across to Dartmoor.



The view, obscured for many years by larch forest, was restored in 2012 when the trees were felled. In March this year three copper beach saplings were planted at the site by the Warden, Lord Clinton of Clinton Devon Estates, and Diana East of the Sidmouth Arboretum.

Robots come to College

23 Banbury Road, which forms part of the Acland Site, has some new tenants – some human, and some robot. The ground floor (previously used as a conference centre) and the annex (previously the base for the Oxford Entrepreneurs incubation centre) is now home to Professor Paul Newman's robotics research group. Paul, one of Keble's Professorial Fellows, has a rapidly growing research group developing a range of robotic applications including, most famously, the driverless car.

Archival Arrival

Eleanor Fleetham took up the new post of Archivist and Records Manager in November. Not long afterwards, to her delight, a notable new accession was made to the Archives - a collection of papers discovered in an Oxford attic. They belonged to Henry Pellew Esq., Honorary Secretary to the Keble Memorial Fund. The papers document the tireless work of the fund from 1866 onwards as they strived to establish the College.

Amongst this splendid find are the draft rules and regulations for the Memorial Fund, subscription papers, a sketch of statutes discussed at a Memorial Committee meeting in 1867 and a report recommending the purchase of the College site by the architect William Butterfield. Fellow/Student Interview



In his 90th Year, Emeritus Fellow Dr Dennis Shaw reflected on science teaching at the College with medic Finalist, Eleanor Edge (2011). They first spoke during the September Telethon, which gave Dennis the idea to establish a College Fund for Physics students. Eleanor is continuing her clinical studies at Keble next year

When did you first come to Keble?

I became a lecturer in Physics in 1956, and was elected to a Tutorial Fellowship in 1957, a post I held until 1975 when I became Keeper of Scientific Books in the Radcliffe Science Library. I continued teaching for the College, however, for another ten years until 1985. When I became Keeper of Scientific Books I also became a Professorial Fellow and remained on the Governing Body until I retired in 1991.

I understand that when you arrived you were the second of just two science tutors in College

Well yes; when I was appointed, Parkes, who was the then Science Tutor, said that GB had decided to appoint his successor ahead of his retirement. At that time there were about 80 scientists and he transferred 40 of them to me, giving me responsibility for Physics, Engineering, Geology and Mathematics, while he took Chemistry, Medicine and the Biological Sciences.

I didn't welcome the prospect of taking over all his pupils when he retired, so persuaded GB to appoint tutors in other subjects. Physics, Engineering and Mathematics all had a Fellow by 1963, and so I thought at that stage I should give support to my chemistry colleague in getting Tutorial Fellows in some of his subjects. During the 1960's GB agreed to appoint tutors in Biology, Medicine, Biochemistry and a second Chemistry tutor. Once there was a second Chemistry tutor, a second Physics tutor followed. That's how we built up the team of science tutors in College.

When you first became a Fellow, how was Keble life different from what it is today?

Well, initially when there was only one science tutor there was a balance of about 3:1 arts to sciences undergraduates whereas nowadays they're almost equal numbers. So we can say that science presence in the College has become much more significant during the last 60 or 70 years, and we are now one of the most prominent science colleges in the University. I think that has stemmed from efforts to



bring in more in-college science tutors; this was a very big difference as out-ofcollege tutorials were usually in the labs.

Another important difference was that nearly all of the undergraduates were minors. In statu pupillari was the term used because the age of majority was 21. College Tutors were responsible in loco parentis for most of their pupils; they had to get permission from us to go away from Oxford during term or if they wanted to keep a car. Students had to mount a little green light on their front bumper so they could be recognised as undergraduate drivers.

Of course the Bursar would say the most significant change is that Keble is no longer a poor college. When I became a Fellow, Keble was the richest poor college- the wealthiest of a group of colleges whose endowments didn't pay for the upkeep of the college and the salaries of the Tutors and which therefore relied entirely on fees to pay their way. In 1970, Keble ran a successful appeal to celebrate its centenary and raised

£1.4 million (15 million in today's money) and as a consequence they became the poorest rich college.

How did science teaching at Keble in the 1950s compare with other colleges?

Keble had as many scientists as the average college, except there were one or two colleges that specialised in either Physics or Chemistry such as my undergraduate college, Christ Church, and therefore had more undergraduates in those subjects. The colleges that had fewer were the new colleges such as LMH and Somerville and the smaller colleges such as Trinity and Corpus.

The University did a deal with all the colleges in the 1960's to reduce the total teaching hours of a Lecturer-Fellow to 12; 6 for University and 6 for College. The stint for fellows teaching only in College officially remained at 9 hours a week, but Keble managed to persuade some of its tutors to teach more than this; they were more interested in keeping the College going than limiting their teaching time, but from 1970 onwards they found themselves able to afford to conform to University rules.

Tell me about the Physics Prize

My wife and I put a proposal to GB that we should establish an endowment for a Physics Prize Fund. It's been launched and an appeal has been sent out to all my pupils to contribute. It's very nearly reached its first target of £50,000, the income of which will be used to support a second or third year undergraduate doing research in the department over the long vacation at no cost themselves. The target is to get two vacation studentships so we need to up the total to £100,000. Any surplus income will be used to give prizes to those who do well in university examinations.




Asia Reunion


Byzantine Matters

St Michael's Highgate



To Bodies Gone: The Theatre of Peter Gill


Barney Norris (2006) has published his first book *To Bodies Gone: The Theatre of Peter Gill*, the only study of one of the most significant voices of modern international theatre. Written by one playwright about another, the book takes as its principle theme Gill's loving exploration in



his work of what is extraordinary about the ordinary world. Barney's play *Visitors*, which toured earlier this year, won critical acclaim.

The Mongol Empire

John Man (1960) writer, historian and explorer has a special interest in Mongolia. He has travelled widely across the former Mongol Empire, climbing the mountain on which Genghis Khan is supposedly buried and exploring Xanadu. His books, published in over 20 languages, include the best-selling Genghis Khan: Life, Death and Resurrection. His latest book The Mongol Empire: Ghengis Khan his heirs and the founding of modern China was published in June by Bantam Press.



Gustave Moreau

Peter Cooke (1981) has written a lavishly illustrated book on the French painter (1826-1898), published by Yale University Press. Gustave Moreau: History Painting, Spirituality and Symbolism takes a fresh look at the oeuvre and career of the author of Orpheus and Salome. Peter is Senior Lecturer in French at Manchester University.



Scotland the Brave

Ivar Watson (1954) has written a thematically contemporary novel featuring the running down of the Clyde shipbuilding industry and the question of Scottish independence. Entitled, Scotland the Brave - A Tragedy it was published in May by Troubador. With Scottish roots, Ivar has spent most of his working life as a teacher of English with the British Council in Spain and later at the University of Deusto, Bilbao where he was Professor of English Literature.
