H B Allen Ground-breaking Ceremony

On Thursday 2 June, the College welcomed the Vice-Chancellor Professor Louise Richardson FRSE to the Ground-breaking Ceremony for the new H B Allen Centre. The ceremony was preceded by a lunch in the Warden's Lodgings and an address by the Vice-Chancellor, who applauded the ambition of the project and its relevance to the strategic goals of the University in terms of accommodating graduate students and facilitating the commercial exploitation of University research.



The V-C recognised the extremely generous capital grant from The H B Allen Charitable Trust and on behalf of the College and the University she thanked Peter Shone, Trustee and Keble alumnus (1969, Law), very warmly indeed for his inspiration in identifying what will be the H B Allen Centre as a suitable project to memorialise the philanthropy of Miss Heather Allen.

The H B Allen Centre

The new Centre will house 230 graduate students, nearly triple our current capacity. There will be a 120-seat lecture theatre,

seminar rooms, an exhibition space, a café, a gym, a twentyfour bedroom "research hotel" for visiting academics, and just over 2,100 m² of space for research and related spinout activities. One of the occupants of the research space will be Professor Paul Newman's Mobile Robotics Group and we are currently finalising the details of a long-term lease agreement with OSI (Oxford Sciences Innovation) which plans to have its headquarters and significant incubator space for spinout companies on the site. The H B Allen Centre will also provide

facilities for the programmes of Keble's Advanced Studies Centre (ASC), a vibrant aspect of the College's research community.

The demolition of the existing buildings has already commenced and we aim to open the new development in October 2018. You can follow the progress of the project on the College website where we will regularly be posting construction



EU Referendum Discussion

In May, a panel discussion on the EU Referendum, chaired by the Warden, was held in College. Speaking for the 'Remain' side were Emeritus Fellow Sir Larry Siedentop (author of Democracy in Europe), Ed Balls (1985) (former Shadow Chancellor and Labour MP), Dr Catherine Bell (former Acting Permanent Secretary at BIS), Professor Paul Craig (St John's College, specialist on Constitutional, Administrative and European Community Law), with John Longworth (Former Director General of British Chambers of Commerce) for Brexit. A straw-poll of the audience, mainly made up of current students, at the beginning and end revealed an overwhelming majority wished to 'Remain'.



Marnie Dickens and *Thirteen*

Marnie Dickens (2004) has written the compelling six-part mini-series *Thirteen* which was screened on the BBC in the spring. It tells the tale of a young woman coming to terms with life after abduction.

Marnie's career started in the *Hollyoaks* writers' room, which she says was an ideal training ground. Since then, she has written for dramas including *Ripper Street* and *The Musketeers*, whilst working on her own projects. She is now developing a new series with the BBC, *Forty Elephants*, about a 1920s criminal gang of women. *Thirteen* is available to watch on BBC iPlayer until the end of August.

He will compete in Kailua-Kona, Hawaii, in the autumn after being placed second in his age group in the African Ironman championships held in Port Elizabeth in April, where, in the highly competitive 30-34 age group, he completed all three triathlon disciplines in nine hours, 26 minutes and 33 seconds. George Herring (1974) has published the book which started life as his DPhil thesis under the supervision of Bishop Geoffrey Rowell, College Chaplain at the time. With

the double significance of being about the Oxford Movement and beginning in Keble, it examines the Tractarian parochial world from the 1830s to 1870s. It was published by OUP in May 2016.

College Ties

David Marchant (1956) has a rare collection of ties from his time at Keble when he says 'there was a vogue for club ties.' With David Senior (1959) they almost have a complete collection.

The first in the series was the 'Lear' tie produced for the 1956 Oxford Stage Group tour of Germany. It depicts a cheddar cheese and a 6-fingered rubber glove. David Senior says, 'the cheese represents the whole cheese, part of our provisions while rehearsing in Suffolk, but the significance of the 6-fingered glove is lost.' The tie proved such novelty, the idea was copied by the Debating Society, the Boat Club and by the Oxford Stage Group 1957 tour of Germany with Hamlet. The Boat Club tie has crossed oars, while the Rugby Eight sported a tie with an image of a crab because 'they were always catching crabs but in the end were a very powerful crew,' says David Merchant. Missing from the series is

the KC Debating Society tie of crossed trumpets - should any Old Member have one please send a photo to the Alumni and Development Office.

The Keble summer tie (pictured) has recently been reintroduced with the help of Rob McVicar (1973) and is available from the Lodge and website.



Making Movies

Award-winning filmmaker John Bridcut (1971) was given unique access to the Queen's personal collection of ciné films to make Elizabeth at 90 - A Family Tribute for BBC 1. It was screened in April to mark her 90th year celebrations.


